

The Lighting of the Second Candle



There are times when all we see is the darkness; we may cry out, "God has forsaken me; God has forgotten me." But, God says to us, "I shall never forget you! I have inscribed you on the palms of my hands!"

I know for long she carried me and fed me, Guarded and loved me, though I could not see.


But only now, with inward jubilee,

"We are loved by an unending love.



May the God of Grace heal you, body and soul.


May your pain cease.


